**Next Meeting** 

The next meeting will be on Wednesday 19 June at 10 am (meet and greet at 9.45 am) at the Church Hall of Chartwell Co-operating Church located on the corner of Comries Road and Bellmont Avenue (opposite and near Chartwell Mall). Following the guest speaker's presentation, we have morning tea/coffee and a chance to chat.

## Speaker

Our speaker will be **Dr Brian Findsen**, an emeritus professor (adult education; lifelong learning) from the University of Waikato, and his talk is titled: **Learning in later life and age friendliness** 

This presentation is in two related parts: Part 1- In the framework of lifelong learning, the main ideas related to later life learning will be discussed for both local and overseas contexts. How are learning and ageing connected? Who gets what forms of learning/education in late adulthood? How is later life learning regarded by various stakeholders? Part 2 – What is meant by an age friendly community or city? Who is involved in this work and what guides their thinking and action? The situation of Hamilton city is analyzed in terms of age friendliness.

#### **Biography**

Dr Brian Findsen is an emeritus professor (adult education; lifelong learning) from the University of Waikato. Brian has worked at several universities in New Zealand, but mainly here in the Waikato. He studied for a doctorate in adult education in Raleigh, North Carolina, in the mid 1980s and has worked at the University of Glasgow, 2004-2008, as Chair of the Department of Adult & Continuing Education. After 'retirement' in mid 2019, he worked as a visiting scholar in Taiwan, acts as an advisor to UNESCO's Lifelong Learning unit in Hamburg and he is the current chair of the Age Friendly Hamilton Steering Group.

Michael focused on the WWII landings at Westkapelle (Operation Infatuate II), using official documents, film, photographs and books. He also drew on unofficial source, such as newspaper articles. The talk was a fascinating insight into the degree of planning for such invasions, and the unforeseen problems encountered. Michael provided interesting information about what life was like aboard a landing craft tank, as well as the rationing of cigarettes, gin and other 'essentials' for the troops. All very relevant on the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day and well received by members.
